A Visit by Western Primary School

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A Visit has been Planned for Members to Allerton Recycling Facility

You will all have read, or seen television programmes, about the problems we are creating by not disposing of waste materials, especially plastic, efficiently. Allerton Waste Recovery Plant has been built to help address these problems. In partnership with Amey, North Yorkshire County Council are reducing the amount of waste going to landfill in North Yorkshire and producing energy for your homes.

In October 2014 NYCC started a contract with Amey to create Allerton Waste Recovery Park project. The facility is now fully operational and processes up to 320,000 tonnes of waste per year from York and North Yorkshire councils, providing a solution for treating our waste while turning it into a resource.



A visitor and education centre is open for educational and community groups and the trustees of FOVG have arranged a visit to the plant on 22nd August at 2pm. Numbers are restricted to 15 and we have a few places available. We can provide transport, in private cars, for a small number of people.

The visit lasts about 2 hours and involves a session in the visitor centre and a short site tour of about half a mile. There is a set of 30 metal steps to climb and Amey have strict rules about visits, and unfortunately only one person with mobility issues is allowed. This person will be able to use a lift. Candling is the process of controlling the growth of Pines which is used in Japanese Gardens.

Our pines are mainly
Scots Pines which have

Thinned out to promote the formation of pads of foliage. Later in the year we will also look at the branch formation when branches can be held in place by wire or string to produce a tree which is balanced when mature.
