Further information

- The government's priority is to save lives and the best way to protect
 yourself and others from illness is to stay at home. However, exercise is still
 important for people's physical and mental wellbeing, for the government
 has said people can leave their homes for exercise once a day.
- People should follow guidance to stay local and use open spaces near to their home where possible, avoiding unnecessary travel. You should only go outside along or with members of your own household and should always keep at least two metres apart from anyone outside your household.
- Gatherings of more than two in parks or other public spaces have been banned and the police will enforce this. Dog walkers should also walk their dogs on a lead in areas used by other people.

Along the stream side American Skunk Cabbage attracts people's admiring attention with its bright yellow flowers in Springtime.



This rather masks its invasive desire to spread vigorously in wet and boggy areas, including via the stream, where it begins to crowd out native species. It is now on the Invasive Species List and banned from being sold in the UK

Something to celebrate When we look at the New Zealand Garden today, ten years after the late Tony Sissons commenced the replanting, we can appreciate how well it has matured and know that we owe him a huge debt of gratitude. The funding for the garden was a bequest from Kenneth Broadwidth, and the Pou Whenua (Maori Land Post) was donated by the City of Wellington, with whom Harrogate has a twinning relationship, to commemorate the lives of 23 New Zealand Airmen based in North Yorkshire who died in World War II and are buried in Stonefall Cemetery. The Pou Whenua, hand carved from Totara wood, is an exact copy of the one on the summit of Mount Victoria above Wellington. (see image)
